# Training through Travel



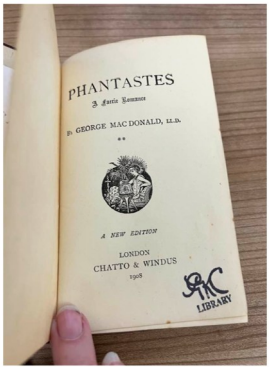
## “The Land of the Inklings”

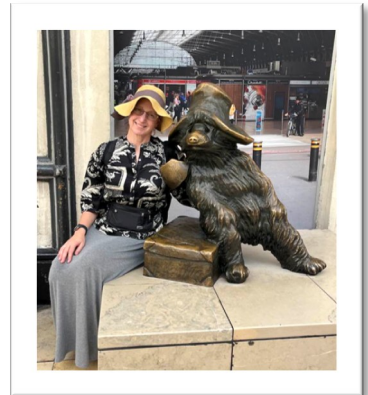

# Training through Travel



Did you know that there are so many Bible-related sites in Turkey that the country is often referred to as the “second Holy Land”? Urbana Seminary's *Training through Travel* is delighted to announce that this March 8-20, 2026, you can join us for a new trip to see Biblical sites in Turkey—including some we have not been to before! Like all of our trips to the lands of the Bible, this trip is designed to deepen your ability to read the Bible better and to hear from God—in many ways it is a life-changing discipleship trip, giving you tools for envisioning the world of the Bible and understanding what God is doing.

Biblical Turkey 2026 will give you a panoramic view of the growth of the early church in the period of AD 50-100!

- Travel to Antioch to see the city and its harbor—the site where the Gentiles were first part of the intentional ministry of the early preachers and evangelists, where Peter came and preached, where Barnabas and Paul were commissioned for their 1st Missionary Journey.
- Visit Tarsus to ponder Paul’s origins. As we travel West we will follow in the footsteps of the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd Missionary Journeys of Paul.
- In Ephesus we will consider the amazingly preserved remains of the city where both Paul and John had extended ministry. Imagine sitting in the huge theater of Ephesus to consider all that God did there through his apostles, as well as reconstruct in our minds the raucous riot that took place right where we will be sitting (Acts 19)! Did you know that early church tradition says that John brought Jesus’ mother Mary here after Jerusalem was destroyed in AD 70?
- Turn North and visit the 7 Churches of Revelation. This lets us go deeper into what these sites and their history can teach us about what the Book of Revelation is all about. Why did John write a book like this? You’ll also get the chance to enjoy Istanbul and the history of the early church, as well as some unexpected Old Testament connections! So much to see and so much for each of us to grow in Christ!

Come with us—to Antioch, Seleucia Pieria, Tarsus, Antalya (Attalia & Perga), Pisidian Antioch, Konya (Iconium), Laodicea/Hierapolis/Colossae, Miletus, Ephesus, Smyrna, Sardis, Pergamum, Troas, Istanbul, and so much more!

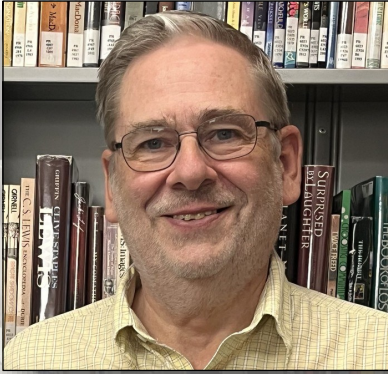
## POMPEII EXPERIENCE St. Louis

# Introducing Our Library Staff and Volunteers

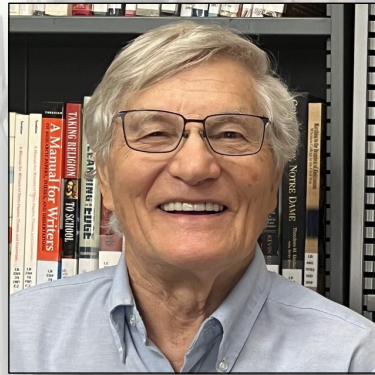


**Bill Grubb**

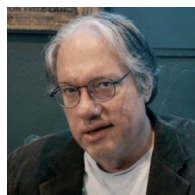

## Weekly Rhythms at Pascal Study Center

What if you could start your week, not with a rush of meetings and to-do items, but with a pause for rest and refreshment for both body and soul? What if you could end your week, not with an exhausted crash or a wild release, but with thoughtful conversation among a diverse group of believers? At Pascal Study Center, University of Illinois students are invited into just such weekly rhythms.



We begin the week on Mondays with Communal Reading of Scripture, offering free pizza, Bible reading, and quiet reflection to all who come. Since August, we have



read through the Book of Acts and the Epistle to the Romans. We end the week on Fridays with Director's Office Hours, where students discuss a wide range of topics while enjoying tasty snacks. The group of students who have come together this semester represent Evangelical, Wesleyan Holiness, Reformed, and Catholic backgrounds, and I have been deeply impressed to see the way they have approached these theological differences with curiosity and respect.



The weekly rhythms of Pascal Study Center are intended to complement and extend students' existing habits of Sunday worship and midweek fellowship, providing additional opportunities for reflection, conversation, and growth. Would you

pray with me that through these weekly rhythms, Pascal Study Center will become known at the University of Illinois as a place of friendship, curiosity, and rest?

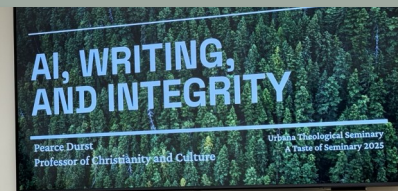
